

Step by step Family Route Châtillon en Bazois

Don't forget to look at the pictures next to the questions, they may help you find your answer.

- 1) Follow the signs for Château Chinon as far as the church square to find the first answers.
- 2) After answering question 11, leave the church and church square and turn left, and then left again, where you can find the answer of question 12 and the following questions.
- 3) After question 13, walk towards the canal where the road turns left where you can find the answers to questions 14 and 15.
- 4) When you reach the bridge, cross the D978 and continue along the canal.
- 5) After 350 metres, you will find the old mill where you can find the answer to question 16.
- 6) Continue along the canal, and at the end, near the bridge, you'll find the answer to question 17.
- 7) Cross the bridge and turn left towards the harbour guard's house, where you'll find the answer to question 18.
- 8) Continue along the canal and look left towards the château and its gardens, where you will find the answer to questions 19, 20 and 21.
- 9) Continue along the canal until you reach the D978, then turn right and, after the bridge, turn right again. Then turn left into Rue de Vauclaix, where you will find the answer to question 22.
- 10) Continue as far as the crossroads and turn right into rue Adrien Laurent, walk along it and turn left at the end into rue de la Madeleine. You'll soon find the answers to questions 23 and 24.
- 11) A little further along rue de la Madeleine, at number 6, you'll find the answer to question 25.
- 12) Continue along the road towards the D978, keeping left. cross the road and turn left at the D978.
- 13) After a few metres, you'll find a beautiful house and outbuildings on the right-hand side of the road, where you'll find the next answer to question number 26.
- 14) If you take a few more steps, you'll also find the answers to questions 27 and 28 on the left-hand side of this road.

Once you've found all the answers, continue on your way and you'll arrive at the tourist office where this discovery began.
