Description

Departure from le Champ de Foire facing the northern entrance of the old graveyard.

(D/A) Cross la Rue (street) du Petit Pont and take the Chemin de la Déplaisance (at the very left), to North-West direction. On the way, leave a path going an the right. You're arriving at Les Jolivots' hamlet (cross on the right).

(1) Take the little road going to West (ignore the one going rightly right that serves some houses). Keep going until the end, walking along the château de Ratilly on your left (ability to turn around it).

(2) Keep going leaving all around you Les Martins' hamlet, Le Bourg-sans-Paille's hamlet and Les Pautrats' hamlet.

(3) From the end of this road borded by funny trees called "tétards", take the sandy path going North-West. Leave a first path crossed on your right (forest path) and keep going to the next crossing.

(4) Take the path on your right and go down leaving a walk on the right.

(5) Pass at the foot of les Neufs Pas. Keep going left to achieve on a large road (D955).

(6) Cross cautiously, go down on the right (the path goes along a wooden fencing) to join the middle-age castle Guédelon. At the end of your visit, retrace your path.

(5) Turn left (visually, almost straight). Cross the ford on the footbridge or even through the stream if the level of water allows it. Forget the path going left and rejoin the Château Colnot (a simple house on the right).

(7) Turn right, go in front of a small pond. At the fork, veer off right and arrive at a crosswalk of 5, whose a larger forest path.

(8) Take the second left path. Several side junctions are to be left. After a glade with a field on the right, a path is on the right.

(9) Take it and keep going to the first crosswalk. Turn right and at the second crosswalk, turn left. Then, keep walking straight to the wood's exit. So rejoin the departure point (D/A).

Practical information

The path a bit muddy at the end when it has recently rained. Possibility to eat in Guédelon. Lovely circuit to do with children. This circuit is offered by the Tourist Center of Puisaye-Forterre.

It is reported and marked by a yellow line (PR®) and is n°23. If you have encountered a difficulty (obstacle, lack of marks, lack of

upkeeping...) thank you to tell us here.



by not damaging fences, fields and crops and not picking fruit or vegetables..



DON'T MAKE LOTS OF NOISE

and do be respectful and courteous to people along the route.



RESPECT LOCAL RESTRICTIONS

such as bans on fires, barbecues, camping, fishing, swimming, etc.



KEEP YOUR DOG ON LEAD

and have it close to you at every crossroads of other users.
Bag and bin its dog poo.
Walking with a dog is not recommended on routes where there are farm animals.



LEAVE GATES AS YOU FIND THEM

be cautious of farm animals: try to go around, not through hersd or flocks.



THE COUNTRYSIDE IS A LIVING ENVIRONMENT

that evolves with time. Waling is an adventure and there ar erisks associated with it. Be responsible, and know when it is better to give up and turn around than get into danger.
